Homelessness Report August 2017

The long-term solution to the current homeless issue is to increase the supply of homes. Rebuilding Ireland: Action Plan on Housing and Homelessness is designed to accelerate all types of housing supply – social, private and rental. In particular, Rebuilding Ireland seeks the delivery of increased volumes of social housing over the coming years (47,000 units by 2021) and places a focus on delivering long-term housing solutions for homeless households. Successes are being achieved in this regard, for example:

- Nationally over 3,000 exited from homelessness in 2016.
- 1,800 exits to end of June 2017.
- **Dublin**
 - 805 adults exited homelessness into tenancies in Q2 2017. This is the highest number recorded to date.
 - 1,400 adults moved to tenancies in the first six months of 2017.
 - As not all adults are single adults, couples account for some of the tenancies. In total, there were 1,260 tenancies created to accommodate the 1,400 adults.
 - 596 households received HAP supports which prevented them from entering homelessness.
 - A total of 500 families had their tenancies protected by the Threshold Protocol.

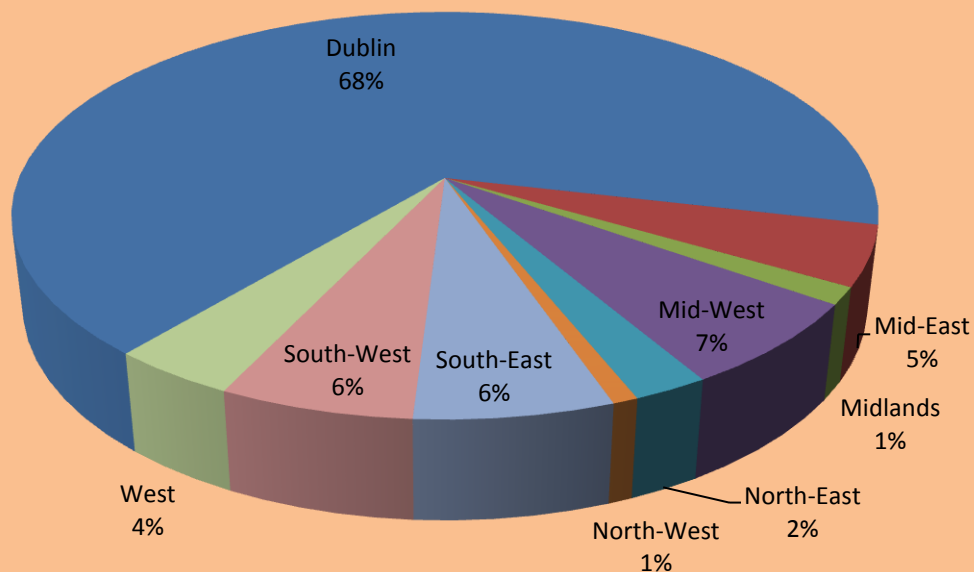
PEA - Private Emergency Accommodation: this may include hotels, B&Bs and other residential facilities that are used on an emergency basis
